As the weather heats up, we recommend all students have a fresh bottle of water on their table every day.


Each class designates time throughout the day for fruit. We encourage students to have a piece of fruit or vegetable during this time.



# **TERM 2 INQUIRY**

This term, our class is exploring the topic of *Survival*. We'll be looking at what living things—like plants and animals—need to stay alive, including food, water, shelter, and a safe environment. The children will learn about life cycles, such as how plants and animals grow and change over time. We'll also talk about endangered and extinct species and what causes some plants and animals to disappear. A big part of our learning will focus on how people can affect the survival of living things, both in

positive and negative ways.

for students to start thinking
about how we can all help
care for the environment
and protect the world
around us.

# **CAMP JUNGAI**

From Wednesday, August 20th to Friday, August 22nd, students will be heading to Camp Jungai in the beautiful Rubicon Valley. While at camp, they will have the opportunity to engage in authentic cultural experiences with First Nations people, including bushwalks, exploring bush tucker, and learning traditional Indigenous games. In addition to cultural activities, students will enjoy physical, hands-on also more challenges like low and high ropes courses, orienteering, and ponding. To help you prepare, the Middle School Team will be hosting a Camp Information Evening on Thursday, June 12th at 6:00 pm via Webex, where we will share more details about the camp. A payment plan is available for any families who may need it.

## **HOMEWORK**
